





"MEMORIES IN MOTION"



John "Jake" Goodski of Elizabeth, N.J. lost a battle with cancer on Friday, February 25th, 1994, just two days prior to his seventy-first birthday.

Jake was one of the early pioneers of stock car racing in the Garden State, racing as many as four night a week at such tracks as Ruppert Stadium in Newark and Roosevelt Stadium in Jersey city. Jake ran virtually every track in New Jersey and did, in fact, campaign his own purple and white #114 in Pennsylvania, Delaware and New York. Goodski called the historical Weissglass Speedway on Staten Island his home track and finally retires from active competition in 1962.

Goodski started his racing career in 1951 at Ruppert Stadium. During an interview in 1976 Jake reminised about his early days racing with the likes of Wally Campbell, George Horvath, Tommie Elliott and Frankie Schnieder. Jake had quite a following at the Weissglass Speedway where the records that were set by Jake will never be broken because the track is no longer in existance. Goodski recorded over sixty feature wins and was the track representative at the Race of Champions at Langhorne three times. He accumulated very respectable finishing positions in the race, taking fourth, sixth and ninth at the one mile oval.

Jake's wife, Sandy, a popular figure herself for many years at Weissglass Speedway, passed away in 1982. She was the chief scorer for the track for several years. The Goodski name will forever be associated with stock car racing. Portions of Jake's personal collection will be donated to the new Rutgers Library in New Brunswick, N.J. for the new section dedicated to auto racing history in the Garden State.

Jake has left us his legacy as well as the collection of his accomplishments in the form of photos, news prints and trophies. This will insure that he will never be forgotten. Jake will be greatly missed!

Dear Members:

After finishing second to Ralph Earnhardt (Dale's dad) in 1956 I decided to "go all out" to try to win the NASCAR Sportsman National Championship in 1957. My thoughts were Earnhardt would be the man I would have to beat to reach my goal.

AS it turned out Earnhardt was not in the hunt in 1957, instead I found myself in a tremendous battle with Don Stumpf from New Jersey. Bob Malzahn was also in the thick of the battle until near the end of the season. But at the end it was Don Stumpf who gave me more than I wanted, the title was not settled until the last race of the year. Only 26 points separated us in the final standings, 3916 to 3890.

Most of the races we ran in awarded 50 points to the winner with a decrease of 2 points per position. Each race track which ran on a reguler basis were permitted two "double point" races per year. We looked for all of those we could find. We had to run in approximately 75 races to accumulate the number of points we did.

Don ran primarily in the northeast, I ran in the southeast, we didn't race against each other many times, but we did keep up with his performance each week. Near the end of the season I did make a trip to New Jersey to run at Old Bridge and Flemnton to try to keep up with Don. We didn't have any races in the south that particular weekend.

I'm proud to have raced Don Stumpf for the title, he was a tremendous competitor. It's too bad he had to finish second. He gave it his all.

Here is wishing Garden State Vintage Stock Car Club the very best. Thank you for remembering.

Checkered Past

NEW JERSEY LEGEND JACKIE McLAUGHLIN WON THE NAZARETH MODIFIED OPENER ON MARCH 22, 1964

MAZARETH, PA — For many years, until its final event was held in 1988, the half-mile clay Nazareth Raceway was recognized as one of the premier tracks running modifieds in the east. And, because it was so close to New Jersey — just across the Delaware River and a few miles from Phillipsburg, N. J. off of Route 22 — many of the drivers and fans that attended the races there each Sunday were from right here in the Garden State.

In fact, GSVSCC member Frankie Schneider of Flemington was the track's all-time modified stock car division winner with 64 triumphs.

From the early 1950s right on into the latter 1980s, Jerry Fried was the "producer" of racing at Nazareth. Jerry disliked being called a "promoter." Truly, he was a showman, and to him, stock car racing was an exciting form of entertainment on a Sunday night. And, traditionally, Jerry would schedule his season opener for an early Sunday afternoon date, such as mid-March. Despite the fact that snow often still covered the region, Jerry would succeed more often than not in getting those early races in.

Such was the case some thirty years ago — on Sunday afternoon, March 22, 1964, as Nazareth began its new season. The night before, snow had fallen — but Jerry's dedicated track and grounds crew took care of getting the three inches of "white stuff" cleared. Soon, some of the finest drivers in the east began arriving for the inaugural. At the same time, the fans were filing in and finding seats in the historic covered grandstand. All were ready — because this was opening day 1964!

For readers who perhaps did not attend races at Nazareth until the 1970s or 80s, the track layout prior to that era was "reversed." What was the backstretch from the 1970s until the track closed in 1988 was actually the front straightaway in 1964 — which is where the nearly century-old covered grandstand was located. In 1966, new, high-rise grandstands were built on the opposite side of the grounds — and the original backstretch then became the

homestretch! And, of course the old turn 3 then became turn 1 and so on.

The first heat on opening day '64 went to the one and only Elton "Wildman" Hildreth out of Bridgeton, N. J. in his famed orange and black No. 16-J coupe, over Frankie Schneider, running his No. 2 sedan this day, and local

favorite Harry Charles from nearby Easton. Jackie McLaughlin, who lived in Thorofare in South Jersey, won the second heat. McLaughlin started off 1964 as the driver of the white coupe No. 2, a potent car built and entered by the famous Lucky Jordan. He had also driven for Jordan in 1962 and 63. But, several weeks into 1964, Jackie began driving the white coupe No. 83, which was owned by his brother-in-law and fellow driver, Budd Olsen. The Jordan No. 2 was taken over by young Bobby Pickell.

The third heat on March 22, 1964 went to Al Tasnady, with Bob Malzahn as runnerup.

The smaller-motored Limited Sportsman division was also in action with their own set of races, and Bill Buehrle and Jim Kemmerer won qualifiers in that division.

The stage was now set for the features of the day, with the modifieds set to go 25-laps.

McLaughlin wasted no time in going for the win, as he moved into the lead by lap 5. But, Olsen and Tasnady soon were in contention as well. While McLaughlin maintained a slight edge, Olsen and Tasnady constantly challenged him -- and at the same time dueled each other for runnerup honors. With one lap remaining, Tasnady passed Olsen for second -- but was unable to challenge leader McLaughlin. As the checkered came out, McLaughlin took the victory, with Tas, Olsen, Charles, and New York State invader Lou Lazzaro completing the top five. Sixth through tenth were Hildreth, New Jersey's Augie Lieber, Schneider, New York's Mike Zopf, and Malzahn.

In the Limited feature, Bill Buehrle also scored a clean sweep for the day as he won, with Dave Rees second.

Ironically, that opening day victory would be McLaughlin's only win at Nazareth that year -- but it was his 24th career triumph on that track. However, by mid-summer 1964, Jackie was essentially one of the "hottest" drivers in the east with the Olsen No. 83. On the weekend of August 21, McLaughlin won on Friday night at Reading,

Pa., which was his sixth victory of the campaign at that famed track. Then, on Saturday the 22nd, Mac took his seventh win of '64 at Middletown, where he was the point leader. He had also twice been a winner of special modified events at the Allentown, Pa. Fairgrounds in August. At Nazareth, McLaughlin had surprisingly not won since opening day — but most all of his fellow competitors and the fans felt that it was only a matter of time before he again pulled into victory lane. Sadly, it was not to be.

For on that Sunday night, August 23, 1964, at Nazareth, Jackie McLaughlin was involved in a crash on lap 15. The mishap, occuring on what was then the second turn, caused the No. 83 to flip into the concrete wall and up the embankment that was behind it, before rolling back down. Jackie sustained serious head injuries — and passed away the following day. He was only 30-years-old.


