


World of Outlaw trip tickets are still available. Call Bill Erbe at 908-223-9388.

Picnics, a time for fun, a time for friendships, a time to remember when. The 2nd annual GSVSCC picnic's display for welcoming its members was as warm as the sun as those in attendance gathered to laugh and smile about the memories of races gone past. This years long haul award goes to Dan McLaughlin who now lives in the Keys of Florida. Traveling was not uncommon chore to this driver as he once traveled to race tracks from Maine to Florida.

Danny, while living in St. Petersburg, Fla. was a weekly visitor at the local tracks near his home. With close friend Jerry, Allen the two met a farmer sitting next to them in the stands at one of the tracks. The three discussed racing and their ambitions and soon the farmer invited the boys to his farm to build a race car. By 1951 at age 16 their first car, a '36 chevy coupe was finished. Eventually Danny and Jerry would bring this car north to N.J. to compete at Wall, Old Bridge, Hightstown, Manahawkin, and Fort Dix.

The friendships that Dan developed through the years would greatly influence his racing career for years to come. While hangin' around the pits at the tracks at age 17 Dan had met engine builder Carl Gardella. Carl would run his car at Old Bridge on Sundays. Danny would have to jump in the back of the pickup, cover himself with a tarp and put tires over himself so he could get in without being 18. One afternoon Carl came to Danny and told him that he found him a

ride. Excited as he was he had not brought his helmet. Danny ran over to Dick Barney and asked," Mr. Barney could I borrow your helmet? I've got a ride."" Sure son" he replied. When Danny put on the helmet it was so big it touched his shoulders. This was the first real good ride he ever had.

While working on Carl's car he met fellow helper Don Peak. Dan would help Don build his first car. Danny would drive for Don in the famed #261 for about 3 yrs which he would consider one of his best rides. After leaving Don's novice car he made the step up into the sportsman division driving the Remick family's #38 which was numbered for the age of Don's sister. The #38 would continue to carry the McLaughlin name, even to this day as son Danny jr runs in the small block modified division at Wall and New

Egypt. After running in the sportsman division for about 5yrs, Dan moved up into the modifieds. Always a steady competitor wherever he ran, even though he never had the big money to put into the motors. While running modified his biggest career win came when he won the Trenton qualifyer at New Egypt in 1967.

Dan always continued to make friends in racing and experienced the greatest diversity as a driver while being asked to represent Wall Stadium along with Gil Hearne, Bob Finger, Don Stives and Tommy Elliott in the All-Star league. This league was set up by the promoter of Islip to give guys added nights of racing throughout the northeast while competing against some of the best that other tracks had to offer. The memories with these other men he raced with and traveled together with will never be forgotten even the one's maybe that they would like to forget. Those representing Wall were

traveling one day to a race in Oswego, N.Y. After many hours of driving they arrived at the track only to find no one there. Since they were early they waited until they finally saw someone to approach. The man explained to them that there were no races scheduled that day. The group replied, "what do you mean there are no races planned in Oswego today?" "Oswego?" the man replied "this track is Owego you are quite aways from that track." The group raced off to the right track and after many more hours of driving, finally made it just in time to make the races.

When looking back people will always remember Dan being the partyman. One party that sill lives on is the Wall Stadium Banquet. Dan along with Joyce Peak, Betty McCurdy and Barbara Bohn started that festive occassion at the King's Grant Inn back in 1967 and the Nicols continue that tradition to honor the car owners and drivers some 28vrs later. Dan's unselfish willingness to be a true friend to the sport by helping out anyway he knew how is a trait that he should be proud of. His speed shop for years was a place where he didn't even have to lock the doors. When guys would come by while Dan was away racing most would just leave a note letting him know they came by to get some parts. That type of trust among competitors is rare, it just goes to show what type of respect these men had for a man they can now call Capt. Dan. Dan now enjoys living in the Keys with his charter boat. To this day his friendly attitude pours out to those who pass by his part of the country. So don't even think about going to the Keys without giving a yell to ole Capt. Dan. Dan, your friendly attitude toward our sport is truly inspirational. Although racing has changed may its people find the courage to stand for what is right treating others as though they would want to be treated. Thanks for the memories.


