

Gerald Chamberlain

Gerald Chamberlain drove one of dirt Modified racing's most—recognizable cars in the era of the mid-1970"s—the red Ford Falcon No. 76, owned by Joe Bullock of Warrington, Pa. The No. 76, which the team campaigned with great success at tracks such as N.J.s Flemington, Reading, Pa. and Orange County Fair Speedway in Middletown, N.Y., had top mechanic Gus Frear turning the wrenches.

Joe Bullock retired from the sport in 1976, in victory lane at Orange County, after Chamberlain won the Eastern States 200 for the second time. Joe passed away in 1998 at age 79.

The Falcon No. 76 was one of many winning cars entered by Joe Bullock in a long career. Joe's Modifieds, most-always No 76 but numbered 85 and 86 when he began as a car owner in the 1950's, were steered by drivers such as George Sleight, Dick Havens and Freddy Adam prior to Gerald Chamberlain.

Adam became Bullock's wheelman in the early-1960s, and drove the No. 76 coupe to victory in the 1964 Modified Race of Champions on the dirt mile circle at Langhorne, Pa. Freddy also won at Reading, and captured mile long-distance races for the Bullock team at Flemington and the 1-1/8-mile Nazareth National Speedway.

Following Adam's successful stint with the No.76, Gerald Chamberlain from the Western Pennsylvania town of Everett took over the wheel of Joe Bullock's already-established Modified.

From 1971 through 1976, the Bullock-Frear-Chamberlain team won well over a hundred features and numerous track championships. Their always-red car was initially a coupe No. 76, followed by a Ford Pinto bodied mount and then the now-legendary Ford Falcon.

The Bullock cars captured numerous track titles, going back to the mid-60's when Freddy Adam drove the No. 76 to the championship at the old Hatfield Speedway in Pennsylvania. Chamberlain earned four Modified crowns with the No. 76 at Reading; and two at Flemington, in 1974 and 1976.

And, between Freddy Adam and Gerald Chamberlain, Joe Bullock's No. 76 Modifieds won 92 times at Reading—making Joe the tracks all-time feature winning car owner.

And, although never winning the actual Super DIRT Week event at Syracuse, N.Y., Chamberlain did triumph in the 1974 Labor Day Modified event at the fabled mile oval.

Chamberlain, a member of the DIRT and National Old Timers Hall of Fame, was also named to the Area Auto Racing News "Top 25 Modified Drivers of the 20th Century" list by the vote of a select panel in 1999.

This is a letter received by Earl Krause at Area Auto Racing News pertaining to the Garden State Classic event at Wall Township Speedway.

Dear Earl:

As an early modified fan and collector of material from that era, I wanted to drop you a note about the recent Garden State Classic at Wall Township Speedway. My work schedule and the fact that my wife is not a fan limits my race attendance to a few shows at nearby Bridgeport and an occasional special show at New Egypt.

Having read in Area Auto Racing that the Classic would also be Legends Night, a buddy of mine Joe Leman from Delaware, also a modified collector headed for Wall. It was Joe's first visit there and my first race since my Dad and I attended the 1958 Classic won by Budd Olsen. I confess I am stuck in the 50's & 60"s. It was great to see how the new owner's have polished what I remember as a gem of a racetrack and to make a first time visit to the Garden State Vintage Stock Car Club Museum Trailer. Congratulations to that group for putting together a fine exhibit of all related material. Highlights for me were Don Stumpf's checkered board helmet.

Enjoyed as well chatting with the legends invited by management and visiting Garden State cars with Wall history. As luck would have it we sat with Pete Frazee and his gracious wife during the show. When they found I knew about Pete and his early days, we spent the evening swapping tales of what I still regard as the Golden Age of Modifies. I saw Pete race countless times and remember him as very talented and successful. He spoke a little of his success and unless prodded, he is generally modest. They both told hilarious stories about hanging out with Frankie Schneider, Red Farmer, Tommie Elliott and Bobby Allison, etc. during the winter racing in Florida.

I had brought a 1958 Wall Program and showed the inside photo of Pete with the big trophy from the 1957 Classic to his wife. While Pete was being introduced to the crowd, she told us the story of the strange fate of that trophy.

I know of your strong ties with early racing and it is one of the reasons I read your column. If you don't know the trophy story ask Pete's wife the next time you see her.

This letter was from James Crawford, Collingswood, NJ as a note to the track and about enjoying the museum and the night of the Living Legends.

Robert Thomas - Broken Snake Racing

While I was at the Open Wheel Vintage Celebration in Loudon, NH with the GSVSCC I noticed a #005 white and blue 1965 Mustang circling the track. I thought that it was too nice a car to be racing but didn't think much more about it. It was garaged in the same garage as our vintage club and club member Alice Drogan suggested that I go talk to the driver. I met the driver, Robert Thomas and his crewmember Dion Chezick. I sat down with Rob and thought you might enjoy his story.

The Mustang has a complete roll cage and is built for racing. It was used as a drag car and a sports car before Rob bought it five years ago. It has a 289c.i. engine with 525 h.p. This is a real nice racing machine and he should be proud of his efforts in building this car.

Rob attended the Skip Barber Driving School and the Richard Petty Experience where Kyle Petty drove with him. He got into racing while sponsoring engines on a Hobby Stock car at Lee Speedway in New Hampshire. He has driven the Mustang at Lime Rock, CT and at New Hampshire International Speedway (N.H.I.S.) in Loudon, NH in vintage shows. He would really like to race the car. However, the cost to replace it, should he wreck, would be too much.

He has modified the steering and brakes on the Mustang. The Mustang has an electric backup for the hydraulic brakes and steering should the engine quit. He also has built and modified a motor home and a van for his trips across America. All this was done by trial and error by him, as he wanted everything in the vehicles to suit him. The car has two seats so he can take the instructors with him out on the track. The passenger seat also has a kill switch and brake pedal in case the instructor wants to stop the vehicle. This has never been used by any of Rob's instructors.

Rob now takes his Mustang to schools and uses it as a tool to encourage children to strive to be the very best they can be no matter what life hands them. He is also an inspirational speaker for the adults as well. With the interest in his car drawing the people he uses his speaking skills and racing knowledge to convey his important message. Rob said there are two words he never uses "can't do".

You see Robert was injured in a construction accident fifteen years ago and left paralyzed and wheelchair bound. The doctors said he would be on a ventilator, have brain damage, never be able to move his head and be unable to talk the rest of his life. He has the use of his arms, has no brain damage, needs no respirator and speaks very well. His courage and love of racing makes him a very special individual who should be an inspiration for all of us.

All of his vehicles are handicap accessible and were modified by Rob. He has crossed the country more than once. He really enjoyed running with the stock cars and planned on staying at N.H.I.S. at Loudon, NH and running the road course with the sports cars. He is truly a remarkable person and I am glad I had the chance to speak to him and get his story.
